Born a Dalit, Dhanaraj passionately works night & day to uplift the hungry and the suffering of his community. Like a South India Mother Teresa, his life emulates Jesus as he reaches out without stigmatizing impoverished families, sex workers, persons



living with HIV, LGBT persons, school children, etc. In 2017 he needs \$14 000 for care & support programs that include feeding the hungry, giving school kits, & income generating grants. A TRANSGENDER WOMAN, A TOOTHLESS MAN, AND 158 HUNGRY CHILDREN

Three stories touch my heart. Recently I learned that an HIV positive African-American transgendered woman, who often got in trouble with the law when she was inconsistent with her medicine, is out of prison & getting her life in order, thanks to It Takes A Village in Colorado, which the Center for Health and Hope supports.

Bojo, an HIV positive Christian in India, reported his teeth were falling out and "everyday I cut two potatoes in round shape and keep it inside of my mouth just to hide the hollow look on my face." Now that he received dental care via Center donations, he can be employed once again.

In Kenya's slums children go hungry when school is not in session. In December the Center provided \$600 for food to buy 158 children a small pack of wheat flour and cooking salad of one litre. The Director reports that "They were very happy to have at least something to eat at Christmas."

RWANDA: 24 goats were given to HIV positive women by the Center. Each woman will give the first offspring to another poor person in need. The goal is to provide economic opportunity & food for families.

INDIA: In January, 2017, a team of volunteer men from the Denver area visited India & Sri Lanka to see the work of the Center. Joined by N. M. Samuel, M.D., they spent time in the homes of HIV patients, AIDS wards, and with AIDS orphans. In July a group will visit **KENYA**.

HEALTH CARE ECONOMIST JOINS BOARD

CENTER SPONSORS AIDS PREVENTION SEMINARS IN RWANDA, PHILIPINES & INDIA

Lack of knowledge about HIV, safer sex, rights of LGBT, and violence against women threaten young people worldwide. The Center sponsored seminars recently in Rwanda, the Philippines & India. In Rwanda youth are eager to learn and men of all ages are being circumcised to reduce infections. In the Philippines the rate of infections has more than doubled and young gay men are especially in danger. India has the third largest number of persons living with HIV in the world.

AIDS ORPHAN BECOMES SOCIAL WORKER FOR STREET CHILDREN & 260 AIDS ORPHANS



Glorie K. Gitonga triumphed over heartbreak and tragedy. She was three-years-old when her father passed away; four years later her mother died from AIDS. She sat at her bedside and recalls the "severe pain" her mother suffered. Glorie then lived with her grandmother, but two years later she also died.

Without the community-based AIDS program sponsored by the Center through the church in Meru, Kenya, she would have been cast into the streets and garbage pits, like many of the 16 million AIDS orphans in the world. Instead, she survived and thrived due to the extra help the Center provides relatives and guardians, who on very limited incomes, take in extra children. She finished her elementary and primary education, and then thanks to a special donor went to college. "I chose to be a social worker so I

could help other vulnerable children," Glorie says. Now she is beginning to work with the Center's AIDS program in Kenya, reaching out to help the 260 orphans and countless street children with their psychological, physical and social needs. From heartbreak to hope, Glorie, at age 25, will be using her skills and experiences to give life and love to others. The Long's Peak UMC is providing a year's funding for her salary.
